Wholly, Weak

If you've ever been entranced by a good book, or mesmerized for 2 hours by a great movie, you'll understand our telling the story of Jesus in Jerusalem. The purpose of the story of Holy Week is to put us so deeply into the life of Jesus that in the final week of his life that we go deeper and deeper and deeper until....


That's what we aim for that week, to immerse ourselves so completely into Jesus' story that we feel like we are there — walking, listening, seeing, hurting, experiencing it. Before there were movies that drew us in, there were the accounts of the final week of Jesus' life pulling us deeper, inviting us to be a part of the story, describing in detail all that was happening.

We are asked to understand especially the difficult parts of our life through the prism of the week. The occasional betrayal by good friends, the injustice of those in authority, the unfairness of life, the silence of a loving God. We are asked to see the challenges of our own lives in this story — God's own son, going through the journey to the cross, we are asked to realize that Jesus knew all the things we go through, too.

What jumps out to most first time hearers of the gospel, or even those who have heard it all their lives, is how weak Jesus seems. The world's first superhero is arrested, tortured, forsaken and then killed. It is how we must look to outsiders when we are going through the bad places in our lives — not wise and strong, but powerless and foolish.

It is sometimes how we look, often how we feel. The story of Holy Week is for us to realize, we are not alone. Jesus knew all this darkness, all our feelings, too. Good Friday looked like the end to the friends who followed Jesus, and death always seems the end of our lives.

Whether it is a caterpillar, a seed, an egg, the acorn, a tadpole, whatever, when we are on this side of life, death always looks final. And then, as we rise up on the day of the Resurrection — to see how all



that is changed. We always look so weak and powerless before death. And then, we are transformed. And the weak, the powerless, the foolish seem so different. Easter is the day we say, death does not win, no matter how it looks or feels. It is not finished. Life is not completed. We have an even greater purpose. The story isn't finished.

This year come join us as we hear our story through Holy Week. Come join us as we immerse ourselves in Jesus' journey. Sit, and listen, and imagine. Is that how I feel? Is that what I experience? Can there be a better end for me? Come listen to the story, and see what will happen, weakness leads to faith, and death leads to life. Come join us in this pilgrimage.

HOLY WEEK AND EASTER

<u> Palm Sunday — April 14</u>

At 8 am, the service will take place in the church, with the blessing of Palms, and the Palm Sunday liturgy, and reading of the gospel, followed by the Holy Eucharist.

At 9:45 am, we will begin outdoors (weather permitting) with the Blessing and distribution of the Palms, and process indoors. We'll have the dramatic reading of the gospel followed by the Holy Eucharist.

<u>Holy Wednesday — April 17</u>

On Holy Wednesday, we will have Holy Eucharist and a Healing Service at 7pm.

<u> Maundy Thursday — April 18</u>

On Maundy Thursday we will have the Maundy Thursday Liturgy with foot washing, followed by Holy Eucharist. The choir will sing. As the service concludes, the sanctuary is stripped bare, and a Vigil of Repose is set up in the Commons Room. People are invited to come throughout the night and pray from 30 -60 minutes as Jesus asked of his sleeping disciples, "Could you not pray with me for an hour?"

<u>Good Friday</u> — April 19

On Good Friday we will begin with the Good Friday Liturgy. A shortened version of the gospel will be read, the Solemn Collects will be prayed, we'll have devotions before the Cross. Because it is not permitted to celebrate the Eucharist until Easter, the blessed bread and wine from Maundy Thursday will be distributed, and then the service will end in silence.

<u>Easter Day — April 21</u>

The Sunday of the Resurrection. The 8am celebration with a couple of hymns will have the Holy Eucharist and the reintroduction of "Alleluia".

At 9:45 am we will sing our hearts out! We will have a baptism and Holy Eucharist. Following this service there will be a reception in the Fellowship Hall in honor of the Resurrection, and our newest Christian.

Come join us as we journey through Holy Week, beginning with Palms and ending with celebration.

FLOWERING OF THE CROSS



Children are invited to bring cut flowers with them to the 9:45 am service on Easter, to help transform a bare cross to a symbol of Easter. It helps if the stems are cut to about 6 inches.

He attended Xavier University in Cincinnati for college, where he graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in Philosophy. He received his seminary formation at Mt. St. Mary's Seminary of the West in Cincinnati and earned a Master of Arts in Biblical Studies. Fr. Jeremy was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Toledo on June 22, 2013.

April 10: Ravi Joshi

Ravi Joshi is a Toledo area resident since 2003. He moved to the US in 1992 to pursue higher education, and pursued a career as a mechanical engineer in the Toledo-Detroit area. At the Hindu Temple of Toledo, he has been a volunteer for outreach and education since 2005. He teaches at the sunday school there, and also has a short 1/2 hour yoga class. He has also spent time in serious study of comparative religions, philosophy, social issues, with a particular focus on the place of Hindu thought & practice in today's world. As part of this effort, he is board member of WAVES (World Association of Vedic Studies) which holds biannual conferences attended by global scholars. He has also published talks & papers on these subjects.


