SENIOR WARDEN'S ANNUAL REPORT

2018: A Good News/Bad News Year!

Although we had some disappointments in 2018, we also had much for which to be grateful. Or to somewhat misquote Job, "the Lord taketh away and the Lord giveth".

The bad news is that we have not had success in our search for a Priest in Charge, which I know is an issue of urgency to us all. The good news is that we have been blessed with the wisdom and caring of Father Hagan, who has challenged and inspired us with his sermons, brought comfort to those suffering or in need with his pastoral care, and made us groan with his jokes! I certainly could not have managed as Senior Warden this year without his help and guidance, as well as his day to day interactions with the staff.

The bad news is that we ran a fairly substantial budget deficit in 2018. The good news is that we were able to cover it with surpluses built up in past good years (something governments would do well to take note of!). I would personally like to thank John Graham for his outstanding work as Treasurer. It is a shame his name does not rhyme with "No drama", otherwise he could steal a nickname from a recent President – he is unfailingly calm, decisive and respectful, as well as skilled in the art of keeping meetings short and to the point. His talents will be needed going forward, as you have heard we are predicting another deficit year for 2019 unless we can find creative ways to increase our income.

The bad news is that our Music Director (Kristina Green-Hill) resigned in order to move back to New Hampshire to take care of her mother. We were very sorry to see her go after so many years at St. Michaels, but the good news is that this has given section leader Justin Bays a chance to try his hand at Music Direction and see if it a career path he might like to follow. We are glad that Justin was willing to take on this challenge. Likewise we were sorry to see Grace Mauk leave but have been blessed by the musical talents of Rebecca Park on the organ.

We are also delighted to welcome Kim Schrinel back as part time secretary to job share with Michelle Knecht. Michelle has been our rock though our much extended time of transition, but needed to have a little more time for her family. Kim brings a burst of energy and enthusiasm to the office, and has been able to "hit the ground running" because of her prior experience. With the increase in office hours we are hoping to put a lot more focus on digital outreach. Be sure to keep an eye on our website, as Julia Burtscher and the website committee are actively working to refresh its look, feel, and functionality. More to come in the next few weeks!

The most exciting project during my time as Senior Warden has been the determination of how to best utilize the substantial bequest we received at the end of 2017. Three committees were formed, with the excellent leadership of Pam Cousino (Facilities), Nancy Elzinga (People/Outreach) and John Graham (Long Term Financial planning). They took suggestions from Parishioners, the Vestry and their own brainstorming to come up detailed plans for spending and/or saving the money, and I feel that we have achieved a good balance with the outcomes. We are spending money to upgrade our church facility but also on outreach to make sure that it does not become a beautiful but empty church. And we are saving some money for future needs, as well as donating to worthwhile local causes outside of the church. Checks have already been written for a dentist chair for Compassion Health, an extremely worthwhile cause, and for a down payment on a handicap accessible playground equipment to be installed this spring.

At the December Vestry meeting there was a lively discussion about how to address our current budget deficit. A lot of interesting ideas where brought up and I hope that there are people with the talent and enthusiasm to bring some of them to fruition. We should continue to move the church forward rather than be in a holding pattern waiting for a permanent Priest-in-Charge.

This year has been an interesting learning experience for me - being an "8 o'clocker" and not involved in music or youth ministry there were a lot of the inner workings of St. Michaels of which I was pretty ignorant. I have learned that we have some incredibly talented and devoted people who give unstintingly of their time and treasure to make St. Michaels the vibrant and interesting place that it is. I hate to drone on like one of those award recipients at the Oscars but I would particularly like to thank David Braun, Joe Gerhardinger, Pam and Brent Cousino, Barb Rezsko and Julia Burtscher for making my life easier! But to continue the good news/bad news theme, I have also been on the receiving end of some pretty abusive e-mails and phone calls, and I hope this is not something that future ...continued on page 3 Wardens experience.

- **February 3** "What Hath Come Before.. a Local Architectural Journey" Ted Ligibel, Ph.D., will be our guest to share one of his (many) favorite topics on historic preservation. Ted has literally "written the textbook" on historic preservation and is a fascinating speaker on Toledo history. Until last year he was the director of Eastern Michigan University's graduate Historic Preservation program. He is Advisor Emeritus to the National Trust for Historic Preservation, has authored many articles, served on national boards, advised presidents, and has been particularly involved in the River Raisin Battlefield, now a National Battlefield.
- February 10 A Brief Report from the St. Michael's Lay Delegation to the Annual Diocesan Convention. David Braun, Kay Gerhardinger, and Barb Reszko attended the fall annual Convention and will share some reflections.
- **February 17 "Winston Churchill and The Dream":** Richard Marsh, a retired attorney now living in Ann Arbor and friend of Fr. John Hagan, is the longtime President of the Churchill Society of Michigan, a chapter of the International Churchill Society. This group offers 2-3 annual events with speakers who research and share their interest in all things "Churchill." He is a collector of original documents, and has spent 50 years building one of the largest private collections of its kind in the US. He has a fascinating story to tell us about Mr. Churchill.
- **February 24** Joe Gerhardinger presents on "Joseph Campbell and Myth" Joe will share his interest in Joseph Campbell, the late American professor of literature at Sarah Lawrence College, who introduced us to comparative mythology in his book, "The Hero with A Thousand Faces," and became more widely known through a series of interviews with Bill Moyers on PBS. CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILY MINISTRY

This past Wednesday through Friday, I was in Indianapolis, Indiana for the "FORMA Conference 2019: Formed to Proclaim." FORMA is a network of Christian Formation professionals; the conference fostered an environment where both clergy and lay leaders were equipped to serve more effectively. I loved browsing through new materials on children's spirituality as well as the ideas and the offerings for Vacation Bible School. I enjoyed the workshops that I attended including; Building a Culture of Social Justice with Children and Youth, and Dismantling Racism. I was blessed to hear plenary sessions led by Sandra Montes, the Reverend Dr. Juan Oliver, the Reverend Paul Fromberg and the Reverend Marcus Halley, all of whom loomed large in my personal pantheon as I was considering becoming an Episcopalian.



The main take-away from the conference was "God is not a germaphobe who's afraid to come into close contact with humans." It would do all of us well to remember that God is always near to us even when we feel distant from God. I would like for more people to volunteer to be near to the smallest humans in our parish. Children learn by doing and I'd like for adults who do not typically interact with the children to prayerfully consider helping out in Sunday School.

FEAST DAY OF ABSALOM JONES

GAME NIGHT!

February 13th is the Feast Day of the Blessed Absalom Jones. How much do you know about him?

Absalom Jones was born into slavery in 1746 and at the age of 16, he was purchased by a store owner in Philadelphia. He learned to read through the New Testament and went to a night school for Blacks where he was taught by the Quakers. Absalom Jones purchased his freedom in 1784. Jones became the first Black priest in the Episcopal Church.

BOOK CLUB: AN OPPORTUNITY TO READ AND LEARN TOGETHER!

I have learned a lot recently about our country's history of racism from reading well-written fiction and history about the horrors of slavery and the brutal period of "reconstruction." Here are two more books I would love to read and discuss with others about very contemporary issues in our world. There is so much for me to learn, as a Christian who vows regularly to "strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being." Will you join me? "I'm Still Here: Black Dignity in a World Made for Whiteness," by Austin Channing Brown. Personal memoir by a young, Black Christian woman who actually grew up, in part, in Toledo. She served in a church-based service program in Chicago. This book is not long, and very readable. I listened to it as an audio-book.

"White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism," by Robin DiAngelo. DiAngelo is an academic lecturer, and author and has been a consultant and trainer on issues of racial and social justice. You can also watch her presentation on CSPANN's Book TV videos. A lively and challenging speaker with some specific ideas. I heard/watched her on Book TV and am starting the book.




