My Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On Ash Wednesday, we once again heard the invitation to the observance of a holy Lent. For those of us who have been around the block a few times, we may have already mapped out what our observance will look like. For others of us, we may not cross that bridge until we come to it.

Regardless of where you stand in preparation, I invite you to join all of us for †Dinner Church on Wednesday evenings beginning March 4th in the fellowship hall. As for what Dinner Church looks like, in some respects it may be similar to the soup and salad dinners many of you are familiar with; the notable exception being Dinner Church is set within the context of Holy Communion.

In the recent past we have looked outward and learned about different faith traditions in the Toledo area. This year, in contrast, we will look inward and consider our own faith tradition as Episcopalians. Because of St. Michael's inclusiveness we have drawn people from a variety of denominations and maybe even some of no particular tradition. In addition, those of us who have been immersed in Episcopal liturgy for years may find that we are a little sketchy in our own recollection of why we do what we do. Thus a Lenten invitation to participate in *Dinner Church* for worship, fellowship and learning seems timely.

Dinner Church uses an order for celebrating the Holy Eucharist and incorporates a meal as an integral part of the communion as well as discussion to explore some of the essential practices of the Episcopal Church. Our weekly discussion will be framed by scripture and based upon our personal and collective study of Walk in Love: Episcopal Beliefs & Practices. Our gathering for Dinner Church will occur weekly over the course of six weeks as we prepare ourselves for the Sacred Three Days (Triduum Sacrum) of Holy Week.

Dinner Church is a refreshing way for families and individuals to inquire, learn, and renew ourselves, especially for newcomers to the Episcopal Church and those for whom it has been a long time since affirming our baptismal vows. So bring a friend, your appetite and questions, and join us in Christ's abundant life.



A CALL TO PRAYER, FASTING, AND REPENTANCE LEADING TO ACTION

An Invitation from Presiding Bishop Curry to Turn and Pray on Behalf of our Nation

February 11, 2020

As the season of Lent approaches, Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop Michael Curry invites Episcopalians and people of faith to turn and pray on behalf of our nation:

"In times of great national concern and urgency, people of faith have returned to ancient practices of repentance, prayer and fasting as ways of interceding with God on behalf of their nation and the world. This is such a moment for us in the United States.

"On Ash Wednesday I will join with other Christian leaders observing this Lent as a season of prayer, fasting and repentance on behalf of our nation, with continued fasting each Wednesday until the Wednesday before Advent begins.

"Our appeal comes during a time of profound division and genuine crisis of national character. This is not a matter of party or partisanship, but of deep concern for the soul of America.

"The group of religious "Elders" who share this commitment – the same group that over a year ago published the "Reclaiming Jesus" statement – includes Evangelical, Roman Catholic, mainline Protestant leaders. While we hold diverse political affiliations and positions on many issues facing our country, we find common ground in two shared convictions:

- First and foremost, we are committed to Jesus Christ as Lord, and his way of love as our primary loyalty.
- Second, because we love our country, we are concerned about its moral and spiritual health and well-being.

"For me, this call is rooted in my personal commitment to practice Jesus's Way of Love, by which I turn, learn, pray, worship, bless, go and rest in the way of our savior. Especially now, drawn together by love, hope and concern, and recalling the wisdom of our ancient traditions, I am grateful to join others in the spiritual practice of prayer, fasting and repentance for our nation. Let us pray.

Almighty God ... We humbly pray that we may always prove ourselves a people mindful of your favor and glad to do your will. Bless our land with honorable industry, sound learning, and pure manners. Save us from violence, discord, and confusion; from pride and arrogance, and from every evil way. Defend our liberties, and fashion into one united people the multitudes brought hither out of many kindreds and tongues. Endue with the spirit of wisdom those to whom in your Name we entrust the authority of government, that there may be justice and peace at home, and that, through obedience to your law, we may show forth your praise among the nations of the earth. In the time of prosperity, fill our hearts with thankfulness, and in the day of trouble, suffer not our trust in you to fail; all which we ask through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

CHILDREN'S, YOUTH & FAMILY MINISTRIES

"Dusty and Ashy"

Do you remember your time in High School?

I especially remember how much we snapped on each other! Snapping or, dissing is the trading of insults. Some youth also say roasting. Sometimes it is done in fun but, most often, it is hurtful.

One of the worst insults you could give to a guy you didn't like was, "Boy bye, ashy!" or, "You look dusty, there ain't no lotion at your house?" While I type this, I'm smiling remembering the nonsense of high school days. On Ash Wednesday, as we receive ashes, we hear the words, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." Is Jesus roasting us? No, siblings in Christ, certainly not! During Lent we are to remember that we are all the same. We are reminded to practice humility. When I think of the cross of Christ, I don't mind being dusty or ashy.

FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL K-5TH GRADERS: MARCH 1st (THE FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT)

Three Teaching Points:

Dirt, *Earth*, *Ashes* – For the creation story, the leader uses the imagery and language from Genesis 2. While recounting the story, they mix dirt and water in a bowl. They make a paste in their hands and then blow on it. This imagery is a good way to recall the creation story and how God made the first human being from the earth and God's Spirit. This dirt is like the ashes that are used to mark our foreheads on Ash Wednesday. It's important to make the connection for everyone – "from ashes to ashes" is a poetic way of saying from "earth to earth" (or as kids might think of it: "from dirt to dirt").

Water, Baptism, Marked As Christ's Own — The leader then moves to the baptismal font if it's close by (pro tip: have a wet cloth nearby to wipe your hands!). Alternatively, the leader can put a bowl on the altar or a table and pour water into the bowl to mimic the baptismal font. At Jesus's baptism, God made clear his love for Jesus. God loves us too. Baptism is also a good way for the leader to talk about the shape of the ashes imposed on Ash Wednesday. At our baptism, the priest marks a cross on the person's forehead to seal them as "Christ's own forever." The ashes imposed on Ash Wednesday are in the shape of a cross to remind us that we belong to Jesus and he loved us, and lived, died, and rose again for us.

Sin, Confession, Forgiveness – The last piece of learning comes when the leader talks about the importance of saying we are sorry as part of Ash Wednesday. They can use real-life examples of when an apology is appropriate, so that all ages can understand. This teaching moment leads into a modified, all-ages confession of sin.

When they had finished eating, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" "Yes, Lord," he said, "you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Feed my lambs." Again Jesus said, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He answered, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Take care of my sheep." The third time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter was hurt because Jesus asked him the third time, "Do you love me?" He said, "Lord, you know all things; you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Feed my sheep."

This is one of the last post-resurrection meetings that Jesus has with the disciples. In many ways it provides Jesus' instructions on what the disciples should do once Jesus ascended to the Father.

Jesus says with increasing emphasis - Feed my Lambs, Take care of my sheep, Feed my sheep.

This is a charge that everyone should take seriously. In my mind, feed my lambs = take care of my little ones, take care of my sheep = tend to the youth and young adults, and feed my sheep = look after all of humanity. This is the goal of intergenerational ministry, let's work together, church!



Please schedule meetings at the church through the church office. All meetings should be written on the church office calendar. Just send us an e-mail or call! Thank you!


Updated Parish Directories are always available. Contact the office to request one.
