

# ORGANIST'S NOTES &

Today's prelude, based on the tune "New Britain", known as "Amazing Grace" commonly was commissioned by Marilyn Mason, and dedicated to her (she was affectionately known by friends, colleagues, and especially by her students as "Madame"). Dr. Mason was a tireless advocate for contemporary organ music, and over her long career commissioned an impressive catalogue of organ works by composers from all over the world (notable among them the French organist Jean Langlais). Gregory Hamilton was a student in Marilyn's studio when I also was a student at the University of Michigan, graduating with his Doctor of Musical Arts in 2001. The work was premiered in 2002 at the National Convention of the American Guild of Organists held in Philadelphia. I selected this as the prelude as a contrast to the anthem sung by the choir to demonstrate how different composers approach the same tune.



# MUSIC NOTES

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Did you know that this year marks the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the beloved hymn "Amazing Grace"? John Newton wrote the lyrics of "Amazing Grace" in late December 1772 as he was preparing for a New Year's Day sermon which was given on January 1, 1773. When John Newton, a former sea captain, wrote these lyrics, he could see the "prodigal son" in his early life. His own father tried on several occasions to help him, but Newton was a hardened prodigal, a self-confessed "wretch" (a word he borrowed from Romans 7:24), distant from the heart of his father as well as the heart of God. Still, John Newton Discovered that God in Christ's deep and abiding love does not give up on -Written by *Creative Communications* anyone.

To celebrate this occasion, I have selected an arrangement of "Amazing Grace" by Don Michael Dicie. This arrangement takes the hymn we all know so well and adds creative harmonies and a key change. After listening to this piece, I recalled that "Amazing Grace" was the first song my family had sung together. My uncle would accompany us on guitar as each child took a turn singing a verse of this hymn. I remember not knowing the words when it came to be my turn to sing a verse but my cousins jumped in and helped me through it. I hope that as you are listening to this arrangement you are able to recall the first time you sang this hymn. I also hope that the memory you recall is as positive as mine.
