### November 19: The Gospels:

A Prescription for Spiritual Growth

(\*and a little help getting ready to be with your family for the holidays!)

The life of Jesus is an intensely human family-rooted story. This is intentional and purposeful by the inspired Gospel writers. The goal of Christian living is to become conformed to the mind of Christ (Philippians 2.) Jesus, therefore, becomes the standard of measurement.

This Common Grounds presentation will be a very brief exploration of some Gospel stories in light of family systems theory, and how Jesus invites disciples to make everyday choices in defining themselves in the mission of God.

### VESTRY TRANSITION COMMITTEE

A priest's position in her parish involves serving three very different roles: celebrating worship, offering pastoral care, and exercising leadership in the life of the church. Let's explore these as we continue our introduction of the Rev. Gayle Catinella, our new Rector.

In Rev. Gayle's own words, her liturgical style is 'joyful invitation. If the celebrant doesn't look happy to be worshipping, no one else will.' She loves celebrating with different communities within her parish and reports that although she is flexible about worship style as the occasion calls, she is 'never sloppy or unprepared.'

Rev. Gayle's pastoral ministry is important to her because as a priest she is called 'to love with the love of Jesus Christ'. While humans do this but imperfectly, she 'has deep faith in the power of healthy relationships.' Rev. Gayle reports it's her favorite thing to be out of the office visiting with people and listening to their stories, which she considers an honor. Because the ministry is large, she relies on a team of Lay Ministers to assist her.

Although Rev. Gayle is an accomplished parish administrator, there are bound to be growing pains as we see to the internal life of the church and discern our expanded role in the community. Even without considering new leadership, we have experienced conflict amongst ourselves these past several years. Our new rector believes we need to normalize the addressing of conflict, realizing it is a part of every healthy human relationship, and, in addressing it, to call upon a history of mutual care. With open and respectful communication, respecting the leadership structure in place with vestry, wardens, and priest, we will remain in God's good hands!

A wonderful adventure awaits us. Please pray for St. Michael's, so that we meet change and uncertainty with confidence and grace. Please continue to pray for Rev. Gayle, as she says goodbye to others and hello to us.
